d) Remedial Scaffolding: To reduce learning gaps and improve proficiency of students, remedial sessions will be organized online

to improve concepts of literacy and numeracy. This intervention will further strengthen the learning at the foundational, primary, and middle years.

Remedial Classes for students studying in classes IX and above will be conducted In-house through expert teachers.

- Online: Students will be identified depending upon the baseline assessment, quarterly school reports and feedback provided/shared with the Counsellors by the teachers from the respective schools.
- The online remedial classes will be organized after school hours for the students of classes III-IX through third party organization and links will be shared on class WhatsApp groups.
- Partner Schools: A zero period will be introduced into the time table which will be utilized for remediation to address the needs of the students who are academically weak which will help them to enhance and achieve their level of classroom learning. These classes will be held 5 to 6 days in a week. The teacher assigned for remedial classes will submit the report, highlighting quarterly results of the students to the Counsellor who will also be taking feedback from the parents for the efficacy and success of the programme. Monthly reports will be generated to document the progress of the student. Impact assessment will be done biannually.
- This strategy will help in reducing the learning gap among the students, due to lack of school access during Covid.
- e) Cluster Wise segregation: School Clusters are created i.e., good quality schools are identified with affordable fee structures within a radius of 5-8 kms, to enable maximum students to be admitted in not more than one to three schools.
 - This helps in embedding a larger number of DLF Students in one institution, create a sense of bonding & ownership and drivean agreement between the school and the Foundation for the purpose of financial viability & effective implementation and for improving overall impact.
 - These cluster schools can be hubs of learning for a collective effort towards quality. The schools will be aided in competency-based workshops for teachers which will not only help in supporting the learning of both students and teachers but also strengthen the partnership between the Foundation and the Schools.
 - Centralized School Hubs of 3 to 5 schools in the vicinity which have admitted DLF CARES Students will be supported through enumerable community initiatives i.e., vaccination drives, health camps, mobile libraries, mobile computer vans etc.
 - Within these schools, a HUB School will be selected for a twoyear rotational tenure for **sharing of scholastic and coscholastic best practices.** This will support a large number of students to study in quality schools at affordable fees which will facilitate in increasing intake at a lower cost.

• Students who are in C Grade Schools will be guided toupgrade to any of the Hub Schools in the vicinity to access quality education.

f) After School Learning Programmes: Class IX & Above

- After school hours tuitions through third party organization will be arranged for students of Class IX and above.
- Identification of students interested in Vocational streams and linking them to colleges/institutions like Delhi Skill Entrepreneurship University, Shri Vishwakarma University etc. which offer a variety of diploma/degree/professional courses. The Students in SBM School will be supported in afternoon through sessions conducted by trainers from Delhi Skill Entrepreneurship University, facilitating easy access to the University after Class XII.
- Providing meritorious students from Class XI with additional financial support to prepare them for exams i.e., NEET, JEE, CLAT etc. in partnership with Vidya Mandir. Students assessed as Excellent would be considered eligible for support. However, the continuation of financial support till Class XII will depend on their final report of Class XI and yearly assessment by Vidya Mandir.

g) College Admission- Counselling & Guidance: Beyond-School

- To prepare students for transition from School and College to Livelihood, through well-crafted career plans, facilitating admissions, career guidance and in some cases need based scholarship support, internships etc.
- Impact data will be created by tracking student progression (Beyond-School) for a minimum of 3–5-years. This exercise is being done for creation of an alumni bank and to follow the journey of DLF Students. The Connections created will provide opportunities to the students who have benefited from the programme to give back and strengthen the DLF CARES Programme through their expertise.

h) Capacity Building of Teachers at DLF Partner Schools

- Faculty Development Programme Teachers of Partner Schools will be invited to attend the Workshops being conducted by teacher mentors of DLF Schools.
- All the teachers will attend a minimum of 12 Training Workshops annually. This will equip them in adapting to the latest changes/challenges in the field of education.
- They will receive training in curriculum design, classroom management and other topics mentioned in the National Education Policy, which will further help in the delivery of quality education & pedagogy resulting in a positive impact, of student learning.

- (a) Use of fraudulent/unfair means to secure scholarship support.
- (b) Furnishing forged/incorrect/incomplete information about employment status of the parent/guardians(s).
- (c) Age & Educational details (Class & School) of the Applicant.
- (d) Unfair use/ Misuse of financial aid received under the aegis of DLF CARES Educational Support programme.
- (e) Discontinuation/Drop-out of regular schooling before completion of Class XII.
- (f) Recommendation received from Management/ Counsellors/ Partner Schools on account of disciplinary/compliance issues by the parent or student.
- (g) Lack of engagement or participation by parent/ward in the different interventions that are scheduled during the program.
- (h) Refusal to undergo pre-requisite formal Psychometric/Scholastic /Career Assessment as maybe required from time to time.
- (i) Not attending periodic counselling sessions/Webinars/Workshops as maybe prescribed for parents/wards.
- (j) Lack of support by parents in the following instructions to improve the overall academic and personal development of their ward(s)including completion of homework, assignments as maybe required from time to time.
- (k) Lack of discipline and non-adherence to the code of conduct by the parent(s)/ward(s) laid down by DLF QEC Educational Charitable Trust.
- (l) Continued poor academic performance and lack of commitment towards schooling and academic pursuits at the Partner School.
- (m)Withdrawal of scholarship support for student whose parent(s) have requested for discontinuation.
- (n) Any student enrolled at Partner School who re-locates to their native village permanently with/without prior information, will be discontinued from scholarship and his admission at partner school will automatically stand cancelled.
- (o) Any student who fails a class or is repeating a class on his/her own free will, without informing & or taking prior permission from the DLF QEC Educational Charitable Trust, the scholarship support will be automatically withdrawn.
